Overview:

Since 2004, Niger's exports increased on average by 12.4 percent each year and amounted to 503.1 mln US\$ in 2008 (see table 1 and graph 1). During the same period, imports increased on average by 16.9 percent to reach 1.2 bln US\$ (see table 2 and graph 1). This resulted in a trade deficit amounting to 744.4 mln US\$, a twofold increase compared to 2004. Trade was in deficit nearly with all MDG regions (see graph 2). Deficits with Developed Europe, Eastern Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa amounted respectively to 178.9 mln, 162.2 mln and 155.4 mln US\$. Contrary to imports, exports were very concentrated among a few partners: 6 major partners accounted for 80 percent of exports (compared to 17 major partners for imports) (see graph 3).

Graph 1: Total imports, exports and trade balance



Exports Profile:

Inedible crude materials (except fuels), animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes (SITC sections 2+4), largely uranium or thorium ores and concentrates, accounted for the majority of exported goods (see table 2). Their exports decreased by 1.5 percent in 2008 and accounted for 64.3 percent of exported goods. In 2008, exports of food, live animals, beverages and tobacco (SITC sections 0+1) increased by 0.4 percent and represented 18.7 percent of exports. Major partners for exports included France, USA and Nigeria (see table 4). Exports to France and USA were largely inedible crude materials (except fuels), animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes (SITC sections 2+4) while 88 percent of exports to Nigeria were food, live animals, beverages and tobacco (SITC sections 0+1). In addition to uranium or thorium ores and concentrates (HS code 2612), other major commodities for exports from 2006 to 2008 were gold (including gold plated with platinum) (HS code 7108) and worn clothing and other worn articles (HS code 6309) (see table 3).







Imports Profile:

Food, live animals, beverages and tobacco (SITC sections 0+1) and machinery and transport equipment (SITC section 7) accounted respectively for 22.2 and 20.2 percent of imports in 2008 (see table 2). By products, top commodities for imports from 2006 to 2008 included petroleum oils, other than crude (HS code 2710), rice (HS code 1006) and medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06) (HS code 3004) (see table 5).
