Imports: FOB, by origin

Overview:

From 2006 to 2010. South Africa's exports increased on average by 8.0 percent each year and amounted to 71.5 bln US\$ in 2010, reaching its previous level of 2008 after a significant decline in 2009 (see table 1). Imports increased on average by 4.0 percent each year and reached 80.1 bln US\$ (see table 2). This resulted in a trade deficit of 8.7 bln US\$ in 2010, slightly lower than the 2009 deficit of 9.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The trade balance recorded deficits with MDG regions such as Developed Europe (-5.6 bln US\$), Western Asia (-2.9 bln US\$), Southeastern Asia (-2.8 bln US\$) and Southern Asia (-2.7 bln US\$) (see graph 2). Large surpluses were recorded with Sub-Saharan Africa (+5.7 bln US\$), Developed Asia-Pacific (+1.8 bln US\$) and Developed North America (+1.0 bln US\$). South Africa's trade was diversified across partners: 24 major partners accounted for 80 percent of exports (compared to 23 major partners for imports) in 2010 (see graph 3).

Graph 1: Total imports, exports and trade balance



Exports Profile:

In 2010, manufactured goods classified chiefly by material (SITC section 6) and machinery and transport equipment (SITC section 7) accounted for a majority of exported goods. Their exports increased respectively by 40.2 and 24.7 percent and accounted for 34.4 and 18.8 percent of total exports (see table 1). Inedible crude materials (except fuels), animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes (SITC sections 2+4) accounted for 18.5 percent of exports. Major markets for exports were China, USA and Japan (see table 4). More than two-thirds (69.5 percent) of exports to China were inedible crude materials (except fuels), animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes (SITC sections 2+4). Over the last three years, South Africa's main commodities for exports were platinum, unwrought or in semi-manufactured forms, or in powder form (HS code 7110), coal; briquettes, ovoids and similar solid fuels manufactured from coal (HS code 2701) and ferro-alloys (HS code 7202) (see table 3).



Imports Profile:

In 2010, imports of machinery and transport equipment (SITC section 7) went up by 27.9 percent and accounted for 35.4 percent of imported goods (see table 2). Imports of mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials (SITC section 3) increased by 15.1 percent and represented 19.6 percent of imports. Over the last three years, top products for imports were petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude (HS code 2709), petroleum oils, other than crude (HS code 2710) and motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport (HS code 8703) and (see table 5).
