Overview:

From 2004 to 2008, Georgia's exports increased on average by 23.3 percent each year to reach 1.5 bln US\$ (see table 1 and graph 1). During the same period, imports increased on average by 34.6 percent each year and exceeded 6.0 bln US\$ in 2008 (see table 2 and graph 1). As a result, trade deficit widened from 1.2 bln US\$ in 2004 to 4.6 bln US\$ in 2008 (see graph 1). This deficit reflected largely trade with three MDG regions: the Commonwealth of Independent States (-1.5 bln US\$), Developed Europe (-1.3 bln US\$) and Western Asia (-1.0 bln US\$) (see graph 2). In 2008, imports were more diversified across partner than exports: 17 major partners accounted for 80 percent of imports (compared to 10 major partners for exports) (see graph 3).

Graph 1: Total imports, exports and trade balance



Exports Profile:

Exports of manufactured goods classified chiefly by material (SITC section 6) increased on average by 58.0 percent since 2004 and represented 26.1 percent of total exports in 2008 (see table 1). Other major commodity groups for exports were inedible crude materials (except fuels), animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes (SITC sections 2+4) and food, live animals, beverages and tobacco (SITC sections 0+1): they represented respectively 22.1 and 16.2 percent of exports. In 2008, exports of inedible crude materials (except fuels), animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes (SITC sections 2+4) increased by 25.0 percent while exports of food, live animals, beverages and tobacco (SITC sections 0+1) dropped by 17.2 percent. Turkey, Azerbaijan and Ukraine were the three largest markets for exports (see table 4). From 2006 to 2008, top exported goods were ferro-alloys (HS code 7202), ferrous waste and scrap; remelting scrap ingots of iron or steel (HS code 7204) and copper ores and concentrates (HS code 2603) (see table 3).





Imports Profile:

Georgia's imports were composed of 29.2 percent of machinery and transport equipment (SITC section 7), 18.0 percent of mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials (SITC section 3) and 16.0 percent of manufactured goods classified chiefly by material (SITC section 6) (see table 2). From 2006 to 2008, top products for imports were petroleum oils, other than crude (HS code 2710), motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport (HS code 8703) and petroleum gases and other gaseous hydrocarbons (HS code 2711) (see table 5).
